Typical Gross Motor Development

- Rolling 4 months

- Sitting 6 months

- Getting to sitting 8 months

- Crawling 10 months

- Cruising 11 months

- Walking confidently 13-15 months

More Ways to Move!







Independent mobility is movement led *by the child* - giving them experiences that support their development alongside their peers.

ON Time Mobility



All children have the right to be mobile throughout their development to explore, engage in relationships, and develop agency to cocreate their lives.

(Saber, Feldner, Tucker, Logan, Galloway, 2022)

If children are deprived of the opportunity for mobility then, as a direct result of not being able to move around and engage in activity, they may demonstrate a lack of self-initiating behaviours, reduced motivation and generally a sense of 'learned helplessness.'

(Butler 1986; Durkin 2002; Nisbet 2002; McDonald 2004)

ON Time Mobility Framework

- Timing (when mobility is typically emerging)
- Urgency (so as not to miss out on developmental opportunity)
- Multimodal (gross motor supports and a range of mobility technologies)
- Frequency in Real World Environments (high frequency, self-directed, variable movement in natural settings)
- Sociability (interconnections between mobility and social communication)
